After graduating high school, my sister-in-law attended a pharmacy school in Baltimore and became a pharmacist. Her endeavor amazes me (she's never missed a day of school in her entire life), but the compassion she received from the community is even more awe-inspiring. With a profoundly grateful heart, she has kept in touch with the teacher for almost 30 years.

This is one heartwarming story, but it represents many educators who believe in nurturing future generations and students who are given opportunities to write their path to success. FedChoice Charitable Foundation supports these young minds deserving of equitable opportunities and the educators in our community who go above and beyond their call of duty and whose dedication often extends to their own resources. That is how we Embrace, Educate, and Elevate!

Fall Grant Cycle for Teachers' Aid Program is Now Open

If you are a teacher or an administrator (or know of one), the FedChoice Charitable Foundation opened the Fall Grant Cycle for the Teachers' Aid Program (TAP). The program is designed to help fund classroom projects for teachers and administrators working in K-8 schools in the DC/Maryland/ Virginia (DMV) area.

TAP provides small educator grants (\$250 maximum grant per educator) for teachers of math, business, economics, or general elementary education.

These grants may be used for any direct classroom expenses, including, but not limited to, supplies needed

to fund a project for the classroom, basic supplies the classroom may be lacking, supplemental items to enhance classroom learning or an experience to enhance classroom learning.

The final deadline for submissions this cycle is **Friday**, **November 17, 2023.**


Brett Noll, President/CEO of FedChoice Federal Credit Union and FedChoice Charitable Foundation Board Chairman said.

Interview with Mrs. Sarah Fleming: "I am thrilled that FedChoice is reaching out to elementary school students!"

We are so fortunate to have many kindhearted, passionate and community-minded members at FedChoice. Mrs. Sarah Fleming is one of them. Not only is she a loyal member of our Credit Union, but she's also very active in her church and local non-profit community, helping people, volunteering her time in the library and making sure that her family members are taken care of. When Mrs. Fleming announced her intention to give a generous contribution in support of educational needs in underserved communities, we felt so inspired and thankful. Then Mrs. Fleming, being who she is, also invited David Bunch, former CEO and Credit Union Board Director, Brett Noll, FedChoice CEO, and Andrey Gidaspov, FCF Executive Director, for a delicious dessert at her house. She shared her life story in this insightful interview.

Like my Mom and Dad, I was born and raised in Brooklyn, N.Y. – a true Brooklynite, with that famous accent! And, yes, I have had the pleasure of walking across that beautiful bridge, listening to its inimitable buzzing hum. The "Borough of Churches" also had diners, bagel stores, EBINGER Blackout Cake, and corner candy stores galore (where I would spin myself dizzy on those high swiveling stools, while waiting for my vanilla "egg cream"). A perfect full view of The Statue of Liberty was offered from the corner of my block! Kielbasa was a favorite mainstay in my neighborhood. And freshly made lemon ices came from the Italian Bakery "up the avenue." Pizzerias were so numerous that there were actual price wars: 15¢ a slice over there – 10¢ over here!" Fuhgeddaboudit!

My Mom was Irish, my Dad, Italian. Although she did not speak English, my Dad's mother taught my Mom how to cook Italian. "Delizioso!" Every Sunday, we had "macaroni and sauce," and every holiday, we had a traditional turkey or ham after the macaroni and sauce! Such culinary talent was not mine, so a chef career was never a consideration. In fact, I had no ideas regarding my future course. Some people said, "Do stand up!" Others, "Go sit down!" As life unfolded for me, I had quite a few jobs, of which the most enjoyable was working for an advertising agency. In

this creative environment, all ideas were welcomed. From receptionist to senior account directors, every staff member was part of the team. Teamwork works for me! In 1988, we moved to the D.C. area. I discovered a different world and a different team spirit.

There were no skyscrapers, but the Federal office buildings dominated the skyline. Their smooth white and tan and gray facades, adorned with the largest and most beautiful American flags I had ever seen, rose majestically to the sky. I was overcome by a sense of dignity. What had happened? American history, American present, and American hope were my new teammates. It took a while for me to find a job, but when I did, it was most satisfying. The work focused on helping small businesses to succeed. I met many entrepreneurs whose ideas and outright courage still hold me in awe.

My connection to FedChoice goes back decades when my husband and I applied for a home mortgage. At that time, my preoccupation was daydreaming about the house. My husband and a FedChoice mortgage professional worked very well together, and as a result of their teamwork, here I am, almost 35 years later, still in love with this home.

But here's a little postscript: Several years after we had moved into our house, while my husband was out of town on business, a letter arrived from FedChoice. It was an invitation to an event, and the time for the event was during work hours — so, I couldn't go — and I decided to complain that such events should be scheduled at a time more convenient for working folks. I thought, "If only I could find that business card with the mortgage guy's name!" Found it! David Bunch. Mr. Bunch answered the phone and listened respectfully as I made a mountain out of a mole hill. He was so polite, and whatever he replied (I really cannot remember), it was thoughtful and put my mind at ease. When I told my husband I had called "the mortgage guy, David Bunch" to complain about poor event scheduling, he said, "David Bunch got promoted to President and CEO."

I am thrilled that FedChoice is reaching out to elementary school students, starting to talk about financial literacy with kids as young as Third Graders. "Bringing the Bank to them" in creative presentations and activities certainly offers a great start for their thinking about goals, savings, and responsible spending. Sadly, many of us adults, including our adult children, live paycheck to paycheck, some worrying about tomorrow, some not caring anymore as the weight of their situations overwhelms them. Some of us work two or three jobs, to reduce debt or to just keep heads above water. Learning how to get out of a hole is important, but even better: learning how to avoid that hole. Also, many young adults today earn very large salaries — it may seem too good to be true, and without knowledge and selfdiscipline, it may well come to that. Knowledge and selfdiscipline — a winning team — for all of us third graders!

Earlier in this narrative, I admitted to having no planned career path. As a Third Grader in Brooklyn, I knew there

were farms somewhere — but I never actually saw one, and I never met a kid who came from one. In my mid-40s, I accompanied a friend on a car trip to Wisconsin — perhaps you heard my jaw hit the ground when I saw a John Deere harvester-combine moving in a field! It was the largest, most graceful and amazing piece of machinery I had ever seen! (This little piece of writing and reminiscence caused me to visit the John Deere website, and it was thrilling!) My point is, imaginations should be stirred, eyes (and jaws) opened wide in childhood, so that ideas can be hatched while there's ample future to see them evolve into realities.

While I was probably not likely to have a career in agriculture or farm machinery, looking back now, I believe I would have been excited and fulfilled to have become an archivist. I love the idea of restoring and preserving original and unique documents — like the Declaration of Independence (thankfully, someone's already taken care of preserving that!) — all kinds of certificates, works of art, personal papers, photographs and films, newspaper articles, musical compositions, manuscripts, etc.). In fact, I have an original hand-written marriage certificate that dates back to 1862. It is lovely to look at! I am still trying to locate modern-day descendants of the happy couple, and I have found many good clues. But, without archival or genealogical skills, this frail, one-of-a-kind document may disintegrate before being reunited with its rightful family.

I don't have too many other hobbies at this time! I have a little senior doggie, Bucky, that I rescued almost a year ago. Trying to keep up with him is a hobby of sorts! Before COVID, I volunteered at my local library, helping nonnative speakers of English to improve their conversational skills. I very much enjoyed meeting people from different continents and cultures, and it was most rewarding to hear their improving self-confidence!




DEIJA CRAWFORD, FINANCIAL SERVICE ADVISOR, FEDCHOICE FCU:

FedChoice Charitable Foundation Receives Financial Literacy Grant to Boost Financial Education Programs in Maryland's Underserved Communities

The FedChoice Charitable Foundation (FCF) is committed to making a positive impact in local underserved communities in the Maryland, Washington, DC, and Virginia area. The Foundation is pleased to announce that we have received a \$2,500 financial literacy grant from the Credit Union Foundation of Maryland and DC in support of FCF's numerous community-centric financial education programs.

INTERVIEW WITH BRETT NOLL, CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD, FEDCHOICE CHARITABLE FOUNDATION

I grew up in a small town in Upstate New York and followed my sister's and brothers' decision to attend The State University of New York at Geneseo. After graduating, I immediately moved into the dank basement of a Rochester, NY, house shared with five other guys. There I paid \$100 a month rent to live and store all my worldly belongings: a mattress, dresser, clothes, iron, and mini-ironing board. I was fortunate to have a car as well. I worked in financial sales and retail management before finding credit unions. It's amazing to look back and see how those first jobs gave me vital experience that contributed to my career path. Keeping the theme of basements, I started my credit union journey as a Business Development Officer, where my office was located in the basement of a school. Most people climb the corporate ladder. I just took the stairs. I've worked in many different positions on my way to becoming a CEO, the first paying \$8 an hour, and I loved it.

THERE IS SOMETHING SPECIAL ABOUT CREDIT UNIONS...

I've been fortunate to work at credit unions large and small

and even worked with a couple, Len and Molly Szumiloski, who were instrumental in creating a credit union that served the local school system. When they began, the credit union corporate headquarters was their living room. Teachers, janitors, and others came by after school to make deposits or apply for loans, all for the purpose of helping each other get better deposit rates and more affordable loans. Eventually, the concept became so successful, Len and Molly left their education careers and committed to running the credit union full-time. They moved their home-based operation into one of the schools, where I later worked in the basement. As the credit union continued to grow, we were eventually able to build a beautiful new headquarters building for our members. Seeing the success of this credit union based on the value and care it provided to members, helped me see that I wanted to make a career in the Credit Union Movement.

IT IS TRULY ALL ABOUT 'PEOPLE HELPING PEOPLE'...

It has been a wonderful experience working in the Credit Union Movement. It truly is all about 'people helping people'. We exist to improve the financial well-being of our members and that effort is done with a smile. I've worked at five different credit unions in four areas of the country and

I can say with 100% certainty, it's an industry full of good, positive people who want to help others. The cooperation and support even among credit unions in the same area is absolutely amazing. I feel very fortunate to have found this industry.

I'VE HAD SO MANY PEOPLE I'VE LOOKED UP TO AND LEARNED FROM IN MY CAREER...

I'll mention just a couple here. My first CEO, the man who started the credit union in his living room, spent at least 20 minutes each and every day in the lobby of the branch just talking to members to find out if we were meeting expectations, how the credit union could serve them better, and just being friendly. I also worked for a person, Jean Yokum, who was a pioneer in the industry being one of the first female leaders in the Credit Union Movement. She went all the way from teller to CEO. Because she dressed so elegantly, she was often asked where she worked and what she did for a living. Her response was always, "I'm Jean and I work at the credit union". She was amazingly humble and had an extraordinary ability to ask the right questions and see things from perspectives others did not. I've tried my best to put many of the leadership qualities I've seen in my mentors and bosses into practice.

IS THERE A SECRET OF SUCCESS YOU CAN SHARE?

There is no one secret to success. I have learned that working hard, going above and beyond, mastering your position, being prepared for the next step, and treating

people respectfully will never hold anyone back from succeeding.

WHAT IS THE MOST ENJOYABLE PART OF LEADING THE FEDCHOICE FOUNDATION?
